## New raised beds going in the garden area

Nick Reynders said the first priority is to install several new and larger raised beds in the garden area. He discussed the proposed project with the SV Board, and then held an informal outdoor meeting with residents Thursday, April 29 near the garden area to discuss the project and other gardening matters.

At the meeting, which drew about 15 residents, Nick explained the new raised beds project and answered questions. He encouraged those present to share in the discussion and provide input on future garden and landscaping plans. "We will be making further improvements in the future to the gardening areas and landscaping," Nick said.

Management is renting a small loader on Thursday (May 6) and will use it most of the day to level the garden area and fill the new raised beds.

"We are hoping to replace the wooden raised beds next year," he said. "Right now, we are just adding six new 8'x2'x3' metal stock tanks."

The tanks being used as raised beds will have holes drilled into the bottom for drainage, and then layered with small rock and new bedding soil. If all goes to plan, the new raised beds will be ready for residents to begin planting sometime during the week of May 10-14.

Anyone who is interested in signing up for a raised bed may contact Nick. Pamela Tennity, who coordinated annual sign-ups in the past has asked Nick to take that job over.
Currently, a few beds are still available.

At the resident meeting, Nick handed out a Draft memo describing the rules and regulations for the SV Raised Bed Gardening.

He encouraged residents to read through the memo and offer input on the proposed rules before they are finalized.

The rules cover Gardening Courtesy and Communication, Plot Assignment, Contents (what's allowed or not allowed) Maintenance and Upkeep. Anyone who would like a copy of the proposed rules may contact Nick at the office.





Architectural drawings of historic Corvallis homes by SV resident Ross Parkerson




### FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH — 114 SW 8<sup>TH</sup> Street — Circa 1909

The First Presbyterian Church is the area's only example of Late English Gothic architecture. Prominent architectural features are the two towers and the single-story circular unit housing the sanctuary and nave. The main entry doors are set in a Gothic arch.

The Corvallis Presbyterian Church was organized in 1853 and is the second oldest Presbyterian Church in Oregon. First called the First Presbyterian Church of Marysville, it was organized by the Rev. Joseph and Esther Belle Hanna in their homestead cabin, 3 miles south of town. The newlywed Hannas traveled the Oregon Trail to Oregon City on Sept. 20, 1852. They arrived in Marysville (Corvallis) with a letter of recommendation from John McLoughlin of Oregon City. The Averys invited the Hannas to stay in their cabin. At that time, the settlement of Marysville had only 10-12 families and two stores. When the residents of the town heard that Rev. Hanna and his wife were supporters of education and the formation of a college in Corvallis, they asked them to stay. The first church building was built in 1860. Prior to its completion, services were held in the city school and then in the courthouse. In 1909, plans were initiated to build the new church.


